Public Charities and Foundations Benefit Oklahoma Communities

Deliver vital community services

 The Girl Scouts of Western Oklahoma is made up of 14,000 girls and volunteers with programs dedicated to helping girls make good decisions, improve their self-esteem, appreciate diversity, and contribute to the community. Hands-on learning in areas such as STEM allow the girls to earn badges at outof-school learning environments, such as the Science Museum Oklahoma.

Give voice to the people they serve

 Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma has provided services including job training and case management to over 15,000 people so far this year. Relying on 19 retail stores and 35 donation centers, they are able to reinvest 85 cents of every dollar back into the community.

Economic Impact of Oklahoma's Nonprofit Sector

- Employs 76,100 people, 6.6% of the state's workforce
- Generates more than **\$14.8 billion** in annual revenues
- Holds assets of nearly \$47.2 billion
- Oklahoma foundations annually give over \$437 million
- Oklahomans give **\$2.5 billion** to charity each year, representing **4.46 percent** of household income

Contribute to vibrant communities

• The Kerr Foundation in Oklahoma City provides community support in the areas of education, health, human services, and arts and culture. In supporting quality health care for individuals who cannot afford it, the Foundation provided a grant to the Atchison Community Health Clinic to fund a safety-net dental clinic for underserved youth in the area.

Advance solutions for challenges facing society

• Located in Tulsa, the Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma and its 450 partner agencies provide food in 24 counties in eastern Oklahoma. Together, they provide more than 346,000 meals each week to people struggling with hunger. During 2015, they distributed more than 21.6 million pounds of food.

Note: The "nonprofit sector" encompasses organizations that are defined as tax-exempt under section 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code. This includes both public charities and private foundations [501(c)(3)] and other nonprofits such as civic league organizations [501(c)(4)]. Exceptions are noted when relevant.
