Message from Our Chair and President

The promising 2019 could not have foreshadowed what was in store for our sector and country in 2020.

2019 was a year of milestone accomplishments for Independent Sector, achieved with the support and engagement of our member organizations, partners, and supporters who are our community and the strength of the charitable sector. We amplified the ways IS engages with changemakers in 2019 through our strategic drivers to lead on policy on behalf of the sector; create, curate, and disseminate knowledge to accelerate sector impact; and build community within the charitable community and among the different sectors.

Last year, we shaped and advanced a proactive policy agenda that protects and promotes the sector, increases the sector's policy proficiency, and builds the sector's advocacy muscle – embodying the power our sector brings to bear as an employer of 12 million workers that accounts for 10 percent of U.S. GDP. Engaging with legislators on a wide range of bills that impact the sector, we worked with our partners to successfully lobby to pass bills that repealed a recent expansion to the unrelated business income tax (UBIT), reduced and simplified the private foundation excise tax, and required electronic filing of annual 990 information returns. We also advocated to expand charitable giving incentives, clarify political activity rules, and protect the Johnson Amendment.

In addition, we released three major policy research products during 2019, including survey research quantifying the impact of UBIT provisions in the 2017 tax bill, values-based messaging research on charitable giving, and economic modeling of five proposals to dramatically expand charitable giving incentives.

Collaborating with others, we created, curated, and disseminated knowledge to accelerate the sector's impact, and help organizations respond to challenges and opportunities, increase their effectiveness, and

fulfill their missions. This included monthly blogs to encourage all charitable organizations to strengthen their effectiveness and accountability, as well as 24 webinars with 12 different partners on a wide range of topics, including effective governance practice and values-based messaging around charitable giving.

We closed out 2019 on a high note at Upswell Chicago, along with almost 1,550 community organizers, philanthropists, nonprofit leaders, government officials, corporate responsibility professionals, and individuals who showed what is possible when we harness our collective effort and ingenuity toward building bridges, making connections, and creating brighter futures for the communities and people we serve.

New to last year's community building effort was the Upswell Accelerator, comprised of established institutions such as The Chicago Community Trust and Crown Family Philanthropies, as well as smaller community-based organizations. The Accelerator was created to elevate Chicago's challenges and successes that would have national relevance for changemakers who attended Upswell in November. The Accelerator's work focused on racial equity and established the beginnings of a city-wide racial equity framing focused first on housing. In addition, the Upswell crowdsource effort, Co-Create, generated sessions and activities that reflected that ideas of social innovators from across the social good spectrum.

Buoyed by the optimism of a new year, we forged into 2020 with plans for our third Upswell in Pittsburgh this October. We could never have imagined how a <u>piece</u> written by <u>Dan</u> as a follow up to our 2018 co-curated article series with SSIR, *Civil Society for the 21st Century*, would presage events to come. It contemplated how the sector can restore the trust of communities that allows civil society to flourish by working to share power and create equity, with an eye toward closing disparities in our most marginalized communities.

The piece spoke of John Gardner's belief that civil society was just as important as government and business in advancing the vision of a better world. Nothing has driven that point home more than the advent of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Quickly pivoting our focus, we began to compile and continue to update a curation of easily accessible resources to help our members and other sector organizations navigate the mission and financial challenges of these troubled times. We're also leading as co-developers with policymakers to ensure that nonprofits are included in all emergency aid and relief legislation passed by Congress – a recognition of our deep and longstanding connection with communities and steadfast support to help them survive, overcome, and return to a sense of normalcy following natural and other disasters.

And just as we began to get our grounding on how to best support organizations doing on-the-ground work to help communities see their way through COVID-19 – particularly communities of color and indigenous communities disproportionately impacted – the other virus infecting our country – racism – launched into the national conversation after a series of horrific deaths of Black people by police.

As individuals, organizations, and collectively, we must step up and do more to eliminate once and for all the inequities in our systems of justice and healthcare that keep us from being the country we aspire to be, deploying the breadth of our talent and financial resources to reimagine and institute new systems that ensure equity for all.

We are a nation in crisis. And while the challenges posed are enormous, they also present a novel opportunity to reconnect with and strengthen the public's trust in the nonprofit sector and remind the American people about our proven ability to rise to adaptive challenges such as these.

Through the binds that tie civil society's three sectors – government, business, and nonprofits – we will see our way through these crises. We know that our organizations, communities, and nation will not be the same after confronting these challenges headon. But working together, out of this moment in history we can create a stronger and reinvigorated civil society that authentically shares power, creates equity, and truly allows all people in the U.S. to thrive.

2019 Highlights

January 2019

Released critical research on newly established unrelated income tax provisions (UBIT), which resulted in nonprofits having to divert thousands of dollars away from their missions. This research, key to advocacy efforts, helped lead to the repeal of one of the UBIT provisions.

\$12,000:

Annual amount diverted from each nonprofit's mission to pay for new tax on transportation fringe benefits.



March 2019

Formed inaugural Upswell Accelerator to identify and regularly convene representatives from established community and social good organizations in Upswell host city to ensure that Upswell programming elevates unique aspects of city that would resonate with Upswell attendees.



June 2019


Launched #EveryDonationCounts, an advocacy and messaging campaign calling on Congress to ensure that every donation and every donor counts in strengthening our sector and communities.



April 2019

IS sent a sign-on letter from more than 130 organizations, including faith-based groups, to Senate and House appropriations committees urging leaders to uphold the Johnson Amendment as they considered bills that would fund operation of the Internal Revenue Service for FY 2020.

Announced the new Value of Volunteer Time of \$25.43 per hour.



May 2019

Announced the 2019 American Express NGen Fellows cohort, 12 emerging leaders age 40 and under who strengthened their leadership capacity, honed their change-making skills, and built connections with some of the social sector's most influential leaders.

July 2019

Joined ARNOVA in co-hosting Public Policy Symposium in Washington, DC to build and deepen ties between the research and practitioner communities and identify policy topics of high interest to the sector, and determine additional work needed to refine policy topics into options that might be advanced to policymakers.

August 2019

Announced 2019 John W. Gardner Leadership Award winner, Sherry Salway Black, member of the Oglala Lakota nation and standard-bearer for Indian Country self-determination, asset building, community investment, and cultural revitalization.



September 2019

Circulated candidate questionnaire to all 2020 presidential campaigns regarding issues of concern to the nonprofit sector, modeling sector behavior to actively participate in nonpartisan civic engagement as important policy opportunity.

Hosted IS All-Staff Advocacy Day on Capitol Hill, with each staff person visiting 4-7 Congressional offices to promote nonprofits' vital advocacy role in strengthening democracy, advancing freedom of expression, and adding richness and diversity to community life.

October 2019

Released new poll showing voters wanted political candidates to work with and support nonprofit organizations.

November 2019

Convened Upswell Summit in Chicago, Illinois – our second annual gathering of a diverse community of changemakers from across the country, including grantseeking and grant-making organizations, to marshall our collective thoughts and efforts toward making America a place where all can thrive.

Independent Sector's decades-long legacy caught a powerful wave at our inaugural Upswell in Los Angeles in 2018 and built on that momentum in 2019 with Upswell Chicago. More than 1,540 social innovators from every focus and perspective came to the windy city to connect, share, innovate, and re-charge to build an America where all communities and people can thrive.

Upswell enabled attendees – community organizers, philanthropists, nonprofit leaders, government officials, corporate responsibility professionals, and individuals – to dive deep, share big ideas, gain new, innovative insights from local and national changemakers, sharpen their skills, learn new, mind-expanding technology, and roll up their sleeves and explore new approaches to tough community challenges.

In 2019, main stage speakers who inspired and challenged attendees included Michele Norris, Peabody Award-winning journalist, founder of The Race Card Project and Executive Director of The Aspen Institute's The Bridge; Mick Ebling, founder of Not Impossible Labs; Interfaith Youth Core founder and president Eboo Patel; and Chicago's own Theaster Gates, social practice installation artist, University of Chicago professor, and founder of Rebuild Foundation.

Upswell Chicago showed what is possible when we continue to aim higher, always aspiring to get stronger in size, representation, programming, engagement, energy, and impact.

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
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
