Conducted October 11-12, 2020

Key Findings

Key Findings


- 1. Voters believe nonprofits have led the way in meeting needs in their community resulting from the pandemic
- 2. Three quarters of voters agree that Congress and the President need to take urgent action to provide support for charities
- 3. Nearly 9 in 10 voters support a universal charitable deduction with a majority strongly supportive. Both statements of fairness and helping local charities tested very well
- 4. Overall, there is strong support for increased representation for nonprofits at the federal level
- 5. Nearly 8 in 10 voters support federal funding to increase the impact and effectiveness of volunteers
- 6. A majority of voters believe the Johnson Amendment should be kept in place

Nonprofits Leading the Way in Meeting Needs of Community


Voters in the Midwest (44%) and West (47%) were even **more likely** to say they thought Nonprofits did the best job at meeting needs than voters in the Northeast (38%) and South (36%)



Do you agree or disagree: The federal government could better solve challenges facing local communities if charities & nonprofits were officially represented within the Administration?




An SBA for Nonprofits

IND	Should Have a Voice: 53%	Not Necessary: 34%



There is strong and **UNITED** bipartisan support for a universal charitable deduction




Expanding Charitable Tax Deduction Messages Tested

	Abbreviation	Message
	Matter of Fairness	Lifting the cap on the charitable tax deduction will allow all taxpayers, not just the wealthy, to claim the full amount of their donation on their taxes. As a matter of fairness, every individual and household should be able to claim the same type of tax deduction for their donation, regardless of how much they give, how much money they make, or whether or not they itemize their taxes
	Local Charities Helping Most in Need	Lifting the cap on the charitable deduction for low-and middle-income households will mean more people will be able to donate to a wider range of charities. This increased support ensures critical resources will flow not only to well-known charities, but also to small, local organizations on the ground

serving communities hardest hit by the COVID crisis

Question. Please indicate if the following statements make you more or less supportive of expanding the charitable tax deduction.




Democrats specifically respond very well to both messages. 83% say that the message on local charities made them more supportive, and 81% say the same on the fairness message.

Knowing this, would you support or oppose government funding to more effectively use volunteers on a national scale to help local communities recover?




Keep Politics Out of Churches & Charities




Funding to Expand Internet Access
