Deliver vital community services

The United Way of Central Missouri provided food, shelter, clothing, rental & utility assistance to 7,322 people in crisis in 2017. While 29,803,128 pounds of food were distributed to hungry families in that year alone.

Give voice to the people they serve

Missouri Community Action Network is a statewide association of 19 community action agencies fighting poverty in every county in Missouri. M-CAN provides training and advocacy to promote policies that fight poverty.

Contribute to vibrant communities

Based in Kansas City, Camp Fire is a national leader in youth development. With 187,117 children served nationwide, Camp Fire has 1,271 program sites where young people are learning to shape the world.

Advance solutions for challenges facing society

The Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation's Kansas City fund supports programs that promote culture and civic welfare in the city. Increased community engagement and support sustains the impact of their investments over time. The effectiveness and resiliency of pre-K through grade 12 and postsecondary sectors are increased through scalable innovations, like: Parent Power Lab, Great Schools Visits and Change the Odds KC. The Foundation aims to engage at least 3,000 local community members in Foundation-supported initiatives designed to build alignment and interest, and will provide feedback in strategically critical areas.

Note: The "nonprofit sector" encompasses organizations that are defined as tax-exempt under section 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code. This includes both public charities and private foundations [501(c)(3)] and other nonprofits such as civic league organizations [501(c)(4)]. Exceptions are noted when relevant.
